It is a great joy for me to be locum in such a busy and vibrant parish. You have been most welcoming and working alongside Christopher is a privilege. As I prepared my sermon for Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> July, I found myself reflecting on what it means to be a follower of Christ. Some of you may have heard me explain my sermon writing process where reading and reflection dovetails with the week's experience as I seek to listen to God's message from the Sunday lections. This week I have been learning more about the work of the parish. I've met the folk of the Pastoral Care group, and I have heard of their visiting and taking communion to those unable to attend church. I've heard of the planning for the upcoming discussion on Living with Dementia which will be facilitated by Shelia Cheary. I've heard of Monday Circle, and SAGE, and Do Justice. I've heard of Men's Breakfast, and food appeals for Refugees and Anglicare. I suspect I have just scratched the surface of all that happens in this place.

Alongside this learning I attended a virtual book launch hosted by Bishop Jeremy Greaves of the Diocese of Brisbane. The book titled *The Humble Church* by Rev'd Martyn Percy Dean of Christ Church Oxford. It has a provocative

thesis; the church needs to go back to basics, stripping itself of its self-serving habits and becoming humble. At St Margaret's I see wide ranging of opportunities for humble service to others. This week God has led me to thinking about how work for The Kingdom begins in the human heart. I will quote Rowan Williams in my sermon. He states; "Jesus begins to suggest to his disciples the daring idea that the way God changes things will be from the heart of the human world. Not by intervention from the sky. God is transforming the world, healing wounds, forgiving and overcoming our failures, by being with and in the processes of the world." Because of differing personalities, interests and skills, our ways of expressing the kingdom values will take many forms. Ours as followers of Christ, our task is to look for ways to work respectfully with each other all the while striving to be humble lest we begin to believe ours in the best way or the right way. #### Please advise the MAT Your View



# June Parish Council Meeting.

Following the opening prayer, we had a discussion on what it means to be an Anglican in 2021. Certainly, a lot different from the 39 articles found in the prayer book.

At least here at St Margaret's we feel a close-knit community even when we have quite a wide range of views about what it means to be led by the Holy Spirit.

Our study chapter from Sam Well's book similarly challenged us to reflect on where we stood on business practice. Where do we sit in the spectrum between head stuff and heart stuff:

- a Church as a business doing its upmost to use its assets and members as a commercial body to make as much profit as possible even at the expense of others but reducing our need to dig into our pockets or personal assets; or
- → should we be driven by our hearts, driven to do all we can for the care of others including social justice and more.
- → Plainly our tradition has been somewhere in the middle. For example, the Child Care Centre at Research supports the community in providing a needed service for which we charge a moderate rent that allows us to pay Christopher's stipend and employ several other people.
- → Perhaps it's reassuring that we are in that middle ground of the spectrum trying to balance Social impact and financial returns

Business arising from the approved minutes of the May meeting looked at reassessing the charges for weddings, funerals etc which are a cost to non-members and the need to reconnect with the electronic storage of wide ranging activities as we seem not to have a logical system at the moment. Out of the several reports, the five recommendations from Do Justice (below) were accepted and the SAGE team is soon to bring some options for you all to join in support of the pathway that has come out of the Climate Crisis seminars. The change in date for the Dementia seminar was noted and the expected return to delivering services at SVCS aged care by Christopher, Adrienne, Sheila and Harry. Helen delivered the finance report (see p4)

We were briefed on the LinC's (love in the name of Christ) activity and the prospect of their involvement in the Community Pantry Project.

There was some concluding discussion on our Governance Policy and Compliance review ranging from licencing to Police Check status.

In conclusion Christopher had introduced us to a new style of running meetings. It was well done.

## **Do Justice Report**

This sub-committee of Council has been busy recently.

Fire Pit and Yarning Circle. David Tuke is now negotiating with the First Nations' landscape gardeners about the placement of the brazier and stone seats and landscaping around the brazier. Kathleen Toal has been instrumental in obtaining a grant for the development. This week is NAIDOC week when the achievements of First Nations people are noted, and on 18th July the Do Justice Group, together with the NRG will be presenting speakers in the hall together with a display of paintings.

Last week we started a collection of pantry style food for refugees and asylum seekers living in the Eltham area. We are hoping there will be many people donating foods for this group in the next week. Monty Asylum Seeker Support Group (MASSG) is running two seminars Monday July 19 and August 23 (both at 2.30) where local politicians will be invited to speak about party policies about refugees. Pease contact Jenny Disney if you wish to attend.

Letters are being hand written by interested parishioners to the Prime Minister about the need for immediate action on decreasing carbon emissions from the atmosphere.

paragraph ask a question about when action can be taken.

Letters need to be in sealed envelope (no stamp required) in the church office by Monday 26th July. **Anglicare donations to the needy.** Just over 100 pairs of socks and 25 pairs of jocks have been donated for homeless men cared for by Anglicare. They plus an ENORMOUS amount of blankets, quilt covers, doonas as well as knitted rugs, scarves and beanies and two cartons of tinned foods have been taken to St Mark's Fitzroy for distribution.

## **Finance Committee Report**

Our Treasurer John H is taking a well earnt break from us all for a couple of months. Helen Robertson is filling the gap. She asks 'Please forgive any oversights that I haven't captured.'



### **Current period November to May**

I am pleased to report the Parishes current financial position is satisfactory and able to move forward with some degree of confidence.

- The payments previously from the Commonwealth Government Jobkeeper scheme, have now ceased as of March.
- Our total surplus for the period will adjust considerably in June when the new Church door of \$12,500 will be reflected in the figures. This large item whilst necessary had not been part of our 3 year Budget Plan.
- Planned Giving remains of some concern falling short by roughly \$8000. It is worth noting that the Offertory Open Plate remains reasonably steady.
- In July the Finance Committee would like to put the Budget together for the following year. To that end we would like groups within the Church that are likely to require funds for priorities on wish lists, to forward them to Kathleen Toal by the July 20 so they can be considered in the calculations

realistically, for the up and coming budget. Committees and Groups such as the following that do incur expenses ought put their minds to it now please. This way we can assist one another.

- Property
- Pastoral Care
- Do Justice

As John Humann our Treasurer has been known to say with any budget, the figures used are predictions based on assumptions. But let's make them as realistic as we can.
