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
ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Parish Council Summary

February meeting of Parish Council was held on Monday 27 February and once again was a productive meeting with all members present.

Vicar's Report

We quote 'I continue to be spread rather thin as I aim to maintain a strong pastoral role with those in need.

Some of that ministry necessarily goes unnoticed because of its confidential nature.

The Thursday morning discussion group goes from strength to strength. This necessitates reading and preparation but it is a witness to spiritual growth for some.

Bishop Kate encouraged me to attend the *Reimagining The Future* Seminar 7-9th March. Other parishioners are invited via the pew bulletin. No takers thus far.

Preaching series for Lent on Sam Wells *Love Mercy* is underway.

Faithfull Women launched successfully with a Labyrinth walk. On-going up-grade to the surrounds of the Labyrinth are required and fencing is a priority' --- **Revd Linda**

- St Margarets Music Scholarship brochure has been updated and sent to local schools.
- It was agreed to reduce the number of services over the Palm Sunday/Holy Week/ Easter season, see notice above.
- Financial report was tabled, as follows: The financial situation of the parish for the four months to 31 January 2023 has improved marginally, in that our surplus is now \$17,604, compared to \$15,931 at the end of December. This is an increase of \$1.673. Across most income and expenditure categories, the variances between budget and actual amounts, as shown in this month's financial statements, are comparable to what has been reported in the previous month. No particular items provoke concern.

Overall the status of the parish finances is satisfactory. *John Humann Treasurer*

MEMORY CARE CAFE UPDATE

During February the café opened on 7 and 21st. Customers attending the café continue to enjoy the amenity and on 21 February we hosted Tamlyn from Banksia Palliative Care who spoke to carers about home-based services offered to people living with life limiting illnesses to enable them to live their best life. Banksia Palliative Care provides services to Banyule, Nillumbik and Whittlesea and provides Registered Nurses and Social Workers to visit the person at home to provide palliation services and care advice at no cost.

We also heard about a Service available from Dementia Support Australia providing an education and respite care program.

On 24 February volunteers from the 3 Nillumbik Memory Care Cafés i.e., Hurstbridge, Eltham and Diamond Creek, met to discuss the remainder of the year including planning for events and speakers.

A quarterly Newsletter will be launched for carers and all stakeholders. Volunteers and carers can forward articles of interest and news regarding contemporary care and treatment information and it is hoped that the newsletter will provide up to date information including a contact list of Dementia care services (including after-hours crisis services) and café opening times for the three cafés.

The meeting was very well attended and the participants shared many new ideas to bring to the cafés in the coming months

LABYRINTHS AND WORLD LABYRINTH DAY

Once a year on the first Saturday in May, 'World Labyrinth Day' is celebrated globally. Labyrinth walkers (adults and children) walk the labyrinth in their time zone at 1.00 pm creating a continuous 24 hour global labyrinth walk.

Labyrinths and mazes have a fascinating history that can be traced back to ancient times. The terms labyrinth and maze were once used interchangeably, however they are quite different. A labyrinth is a single circuitous pathway which leads to the centre – a resting place before the return journey back, whereas a maze has multiple paths, with one correct path leading to the centre that is hidden amongst many dead ends and junctions.

Labyrinths appear in mythology – one famous Greek myth is that of the fight between Theseus and the Minotaur.

In Medieval times many people who were unable to make a physical journey to Jerusalem would walk the labyrinth instead as their pilgrimage. These labyrinths have given inspiration to people walking them from those ancient days to now – a mystical experience.

World Labyrinth Day SATURDAY MAY 6 2023 WALK AS ONE AT 1PM FOR WORLD PEACE

World Labyrinth Day creates a unified wave of peace around the world by walking as one at 1.00whereever you are



If we look carefully at the natural world around us we can see examples of 'labyrinths' that abound in nature – for example the 'spider's web', water rippling outwards and if we take our thumb print we will also see the 'swirls'.

Labyrinths are found across the world indoors and outdoors. Many designs abound, all with a single path to the centre, a resting place, before returning along the path. One of the most famous labyrinths, with eleven circuits, is found at Chartres Cathedral near Paris. Each labyrinth walk is a different experience. Starting at the threshold, as you walk in, let go the cares of the world to empty and quiet the mind, when you reach the centre stop and meditate before returning.

ANGLICARE

Last week, Bob the Anglicare worker who lives in Montmorency, collected a huge load of foods, school materials and some 'lightly used' clothes and took them to the Anglicare hub in Lilydale. The day before he had picked up 4 large bags of knitted items from Bev Thompson. Personally, I felt quite overwhelmed by the response of parishioners and friends in the weeks since Christmas, and Bob was delighted. He works at all the Anglicare Hubs in Melbourne and sees staff treating hundreds of needy clients.

In Anglicare's February newsletter the plight of vulnerable students was highlighted. Many families are facing a daily struggle with poverty, family violence, mental health issues and unemployment and children as early as Grade Four stop attending school. Anglicare is working with some schools as one worker noted, 'to create more reasons to keep going to school and to keep trying. We support them, constantly telling them, "you are amazing, and you can do this' because they are and they can'".

Family workers take the time to get to know the needs and challenges the students face, giving them individualized attention and encouraging the students to join in group activities.

The school books and pens and pencils that we donated go towards helping children stay at school. Next week is the first of the quarterly meetings of the Anglicare Victoria Partnership Group in Melbourne and our parish will be represented. Our donations will be recognized and we will learn more about Anglicare's programs.
