Parish Council Report

At the last Parish Council meeting chaired by Rev Linda we covered the following agenda items:

- Business Arising from last meeting: the terms of reference for the Council sub committees were received and put into the procedures manual.
- Action List: the issue of payment to vergers was discussed and a decision was made that such payments be formalised.
- The vicar's report was received with thanks. The main points she noted were:
- > I am hopeful that we will soon have a firm date for announcing the news of the incumbent
- I have had a firm message from Clem Taplin that it is time for me to take a break.



Parish Council Report (Contd)

She is correct. She can cover me on June 25th and Wednesday 21st. Clem suggests I set up Morning Prayer for 28th June

- We continue to be "thin on the ground" for those who can take Home Communion
- Over the past two weeks I have had two funerals on-the-go at once.. Without Carolyn in the office I could not have managed it! Her efficiency is remarkable
- The Prevention Of Violence Against Women Project is underway. I have attended the first meeting with folk from other churches. Two of our parishioners have expressed interest in joining a Steering Committee
- Finance Report: John Humann reported that the finances of the parish were healthy. There was discussion on church heating and this was to be looked into by the property committee. The change in procedures for casual employees was noted.

The use of a cash card machine for the upcoming garage and goodies sale was approved. There was discussion about a similar facility for casual giving at regular and special services such as funerals.

 Subcommittee reports were received from Pastoral Care, Property, Do Justice, Marketing & communication.

Word Environment Day Program

Amnesty International, OXFAM and St.Margaret's Eltham have partnered to show the documentary "FRANKLIN" which follows the eighth - generation Tasmanian Oliver Cassidy as he embarks on a life changing solo raft trip down the mighty, beautiful Franklin River. His aim is to retrace his late father's trip made to attend the blockade that saved the World Heritage listed national park from being destroyed by a huge hydroelectric dam project in the early 1980s.

PROGRAM MC: Mitzi Tuke Acknowledgement of Country

Marguerite Marshall: A Climate Reality Leader trained by Al Gore. A climate campaigner for decades, Marguerite will talk about urgent action needed to prevent catastrophic change and how joining others will help achieve success.

Margaret's to a service held in the hall. Step into the hall, you'll see a host of four-footed creatures gathered with their humans.
